

Content Area: Vision



Typical development: 0 to 3 Months

Birth to 1 Month

- Turn eyes and head to light source
- Fixation beginning
- High contrast (black/white) interest
- Attraction to movement

2 to 3 Months

- Social smile develops
- Tracking with eyes
- Reaching toward hanging items
- Color vision begins high contrast colors preferred
- Vision and motor

Typical Visual Development



Typical Development: 4 to 6 Months

- Eyes are working together
- Interest in hands
- Reaching toward faces and objects
- Watches toys that fall or roll away from body
- Shift of Gaze
- Notices distant objects moving people and objects
- What should we see with motor development?



Typical Development: 7 to 10 Months

- Interest in pictures and picture books
- Recognize partially hidden objects
- Eye/hand coordination improving
- Able to see small pieces of cereal and crumbs




Typical Development: 11 to 12 Months

- Looking through windows
- Recognizing people and objects and pictures
- Explores depth (container play)
- Full color



Through the Eyes of Babes



Impact of Vision Impairment on Learning

- \mathbf{V} = Variety and range of experiences
 - I = Imitative learning; Incidental learning
 - S = Self-help skills; Social skills; Delay in understanding by sound alone; Sleep problems
 - I = Integration of sensory information; Interaction with environment
 - Orientation & Mobility; Object permanence
 - **N** = Non-verbal communication

Atypical Development: Common Diagnoses

- Optic Nerve Hypoplasia (ONH)/(SOH)
- Optic Nerve Atrophy
- Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP)
- Cataracts
- Albinism
- Strabismus/Nystagmus
- Cortical Visual Impairment (CVI)

Red Flags: From Record Review

- Family History
- Prenatal Substance Exposure
- Prenatal Viruses
- Postnatal Infections
- Traumatic Brain Injury
- Seizures
- Prematurity
- Young mother

Red Flags: Appearance of Eye


- Cloudy appearance
- Excessive Tearing or Discharge
- Pupil size discrepancy
- Unusual red eye response to flash photo
- Jerky eye movements (Nystagmus)

Red Flags: Early Observations (3 Months)

- No response to light/excessive response to light
- Lack of Eye Contact especially when nursing
- Lack of fix and follow
- Lack of social smile
- Chronic tearing/discharge
- Excessive sleeping doesn't seem stimulated

Red Flags: Observations (6 Months)

- Persistent eye turn (esotropia/exotropia)
- Lack of visually guided reach
- Lack of smooth pursuit when tracking
- Lack of recognition of familiar people (mainly family)
- Persistent pressing on eye



Cortical Visual Impairment

- Neurological
- Other names (CVI, Cerebral Visual Impairment, Delayed Visual Maturation)
- Can occur independently or with an ocular condition
- The majority of children with CVI have additional diagnoses
- Unique set of visual behaviors

CVI – Common Causes

- Brain Bleeds
- Periventricular Leukomalacia (PVL)
- Stroke
- Hydrocephalus
- Cerebral Palsy
- Chromosomal Disorder
- Trauma
- Meningitis

CVI – Red Flags

- My baby had a normal eye exam, but things don't seem right
- It looks like my baby is "looking through me" not at me
- My baby only stares at windows and lights
- My baby only responds to toys with music, noise and lights
- My baby will only look at things that are red
- My baby cries everywhere but our home

CVI Visual Behaviors

- Atypical visual reflex
- Latency
- Attraction to Light
- Attraction to Movement
- Preferred Visual Field
- Visual Novelty

- Distance
- Color
- Visual Complexity
- Lack of Visually Guided Reach

Addressing Parent Concerns: Listening and Responding

- Parents know best listen to their concerns and validate them
- Ask a lot of questions to clarify
- Talk to them about making a referral
- Include a vision specialist in the initial evaluation if vision is a concern
- Know what Legally Blind means
