PROGRAM UPDATES

SFY17 Service Coordination Grant Program Report

In light of the many transitions counties are experiencing as SFY17 winds down, DODD will not be requiring a final program report for the SFY17 service coordination grant. Please follow up with your EI program consultant if you have any questions.

SFY17 Transition Baseline

Activities related to the SFY17 Transition Steps and Services and Transition Planning Conference (TPC) baseline analyses are underway. For counties included in the Transition analyses, the data cleaning period ended on May 8. All relevant deletions were processed by May 15, and data reentry following deletions should have been completed by May 19. Data were extracted from Early Track May 22 and data inquiries will be sent out in early June.

Documentation of Eligibility Based on Hearing Loss Diagnosis

Rule 3701-8-07 requires that EI service coordination contractors ensure that infants and toddlers referred to the early intervention system have their eligibility determined within 45 calendar days of program referral. For children who have a diagnosed physical or mental condition with a high probability of resulting in a developmental delay, the service coordinator needs to request and obtain documentation of the qualifying diagnosed condition within the 45-Day period or offer an evaluation. Deafness, including hearing impairments, is one such condition that meets eligibility requirements (Appendix 07-A).

Individual Diagnostic Reports that confirm permanent hearing loss are reported to ODH from diagnosing audiologists for many children through the ODH HI*TRACK data system. Effective May 26, 2017, these Diagnostic Reports can be requested from ODH and used to meet eligibility

requirements for hearing loss. Under "Hearing Disposition," the results should indicate a confirmed hearing loss. The type of loss may be specified or may be undetermined, as long as a loss is confirmed. As with any diagnosis, the Service Coordinator must document the date that the documentation is received, both in case notes and in Early Track.

To request a copy of the Individual Diagnostic Report for a child with a hearing loss, service coordinators should e-mail Allyson Vanhorn (allyson.vanhorn@odh.ohio.gov) at ODH. If you have any questions about how these reports can document eligibility for Early Intervention, please contact your EI program consultant.

Reminder: Two-Step Process for Service Coordination Credential Renewals

Renewing your Service Coordinator credential via the Ohio Professional Registry (OPR) is a two-part process. It is very important to complete the second step, or your request will not be sent to the approval queue.

Step One: Upload certificates for the required trainings for your level of credential.

Step Two: Submit a renewal application by following these steps:

- 1) Click "Applications" on the left side of the page
- 2) Click "Home Visiting/Service Coordination"
- 3) Check the box next to the credential you want to renew (do not select the training list; it is for initial credentials)
- 4) Submit the application.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT: COACHING

What is coaching?

Coaching is an evidence-based interaction style used with adult learners such as parents, caregivers, and other team members. Coaching is used to build capacity and to assist parents, caregivers, and other team members with recognizing and reflecting on what they do to support a child's learning and development. The key components of coaching include—

- Joint-planning,
- Observation,
- Action/practice,
- Reflection, and
- Feedback

For parents, caregivers, and team members, coaching supports the development of competence and confidence to implement planned strategies and interventions in order to increase the child's

learning opportunities, and participation in activities and routines that the family needs or wants to participate in. (Shelden and Rush; FIPP 2006 Coaching in Early Childhood).

Should I share with parents/caregivers that I will be using "coaching" during our interactions?

Remember that coaching is an *interaction style*. It is not the *service* that you are providing to parents and caregivers. Coaching is similar to the physician's "bed-side manner" and in early intervention this is how the primary service provider, secondary service provider, service coordinator, and other team members interact, communicate, and work alongside with the important adults in the child's world. (Hanft and Pilkington, 2000). As such, it is not necessary to "call-out" your interaction style. Instead, what is helpful is to explain how you will provide help-giving and capacity-building supports.

It might be useful to share with parents and caregivers that during each visit you will provide the EI service listed on their IFSP. You will do this by checking in with them about what happened in-between the visit, observe the child in the planned activity setting in the home or community, "fine-tune" or brainstorm new strategies, model and/or try them out, and provide the parent and caregiver the opportunity to reflect on the visit activities and provide them with feedback. Finally, develop a joint plan for what the parent/caregiver will do in-between visits and when the next visit will occur. Be sure to include the specific activity that you and the parent/caregiver will focus on between visits.

A flyer accompanies this bi-weekly communication that you may share with families that explains what a visit should look like when using coaching as the primary interaction style.
