PROGRAM UPDATES

General Supervision – Highlight of the Week

This week we are introducing a new section of the EI Program Updates that will focus on general supervision requirements. As you will recall, last spring we shared information about the US Department of Education's Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) and their plan to complete site visits of states to monitor their compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). OSEP released a document outlining guidance on state general supervision responsibilities last July. The guidance is available here:

As Ohio prepares for OSEP's upcoming visit, EI Program Updates will include a "highlight of the week" to remind programs of specific Part C requirements and offer resources, tips, and strategies to support programs in achieving and maintaining compliance. Featured topics will go beyond the baseline indicators and address related requirements, such as prior written notice, parent consent, and qualified personnel, and system components such as fiscal management and dispute resolution. Part C Application for Federal Funding

The Department of Children and Youth will be applying this upcoming fiscal year for federal Part C funds. The application for funding has been posted for 60 days of public participation. The department will accept public comment on the application for the

2024 EI Family Questionnaire

To allow local programs time to focus on learning and implementing new rules after July 1, the annual EI family questionnaire process will begin earlier than in past years. All families who were served on March 1 will receive the questionnaire, and we anticipate sending the questionnaires to families in late April or early May. The items on the questionnaire and the process for distribution and response will remain the same as in recent years. We will hold a webinar on April 23 from 2:00-3:00pm to review the process and share tips for engaging families. We encourage anyone involved in the family questionnaire process to attend. SFY24 Transition Compliance – Local Educational Agency (LEA) Notification

DODD has analyzed SFY 2024 data related to notification to the LEA of children potentially eligible for Part B services as required by 34 CFR section 303.209(b)(1). In completing this analysis, DODD staff examined reports submitted to the LEAs by February 1, 2024. Results memos were sent March 15. SFY24 Timely Receipt of Services (TRS) Baseline

SFY24 Transition Baseline

Activities for the SFY24 Transition (Steps & Services and the transition planning conference (TPC)) baseline will begin soon. We encourage all counties to attend, regardless of whether they are part of the Transition baseline.

Notification Regarding Service Coordination Credentials Requirements Effective July 1, 2024

Revisions to Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) 5123-10-04, are expected to take effect on July 1, 2024. One of the proposed changes will require that individuals holding one-year credentials (EI service coordinator or supervisor) complete five out of eight modules contained within Principles of Service Coordination (POSC) prior to renewing for a second year. The POSC modules that are required to be completed are the following:

(EI-021) POSC Module One: Introduction to Early Intervention
(EI-041) POSC Module Two: Individualized Family Service Plan Process Part I
(EI-042) POSC Module Three: Individualized Family Service Plan Process Part II
(EI-043) POSC Module Four: Monitoring Service Delivery; and
(EI-044) POSC Module Five: Transition

If you currently hold a one-year credential that will require renewal after July 1, 2024, please complete the modules in time to renew your credential. Failure to complete the required modules will result in a lapse of your credential. Please email Tiffany Madden (tiffany.madden@childrenandyouth.ohio.gov) with any questions.
