

Ohio Child Outcome Summary Process Electronic “Binder”

Introduction

The Child Outcomes Summary (COS) process is a team-based process for summarizing information about a child’s functioning in each of the three global child outcome areas: positive social-emotional skills, acquisition and use of knowledge and skills; and use of appropriate behavior to meet needs. The team considers multiple sources of information across settings and situations about the child’s functioning in order to determine and report the child’s rating. An abundance of resources exist to help teams navigate and implement the COS process. Ohio DODD administrators have provided programs with a curated list of resources to help teams engage in each step of the COS process.

Instructions

Use the resources below to prepare team members to collaborate effectively in the Child Outcome Summary process. The resource below were selected to help teams (1) prepare all members for the COS process; (2) discuss and make a team decision; (3) document and report the team decision; and (4) monitor the process to ensure fidelity to the process and high quality data.
